


WG3 | PPL Policies and their Significance for Children's Development and Well-Being

Challenges of WG3:

- WG3 is dedicated to understanding the relationship between PPL policy as a welfare state instrument and children's rights
- WG3 focusses on PPL policy design and its consequences for children's development and well-being as a matter of sustainable European societies
- This focus is new and aims at filling a research and discussion gap in PPL research









Little focus on children in the current PPL research

- Daly (2021): Currently, the focus is rather on effects of PPL policy design on parents than on children
- Khan (2020): When paid family leave is not available, the social and economic costs to the family as well as the society can rise
- According to our "survey" it differs weather and how countries address the child in their PPL legislation
- However, in the recent "EU Strategy on the Rights of the Child" (EC 2021) children's rights to PPL is not a specifically named dimension; also the recent EU Directive on work-life balance does not provide for the consideration of the child's perspective
- +Few academic research that applies the child perspective on PPL: Ingólfur V. Gíslason and Berit Brandht (2011). Family policies and the best interest of the child, in Eydal and Gíslason (Eds). Parental leave, childcare and gender equality in the Nordic countries + A Phd Study by Bungum from 2007...










Convention of the Rights of the Child (UN, 1989)

- "the child, by reason of its physical and mental immaturity, needs special safeguards and care, including appropriate legal protection, before as well as after birth"
- Article 3.1: In all actions concerning children, whether undertaken by public or private social welfare institutions, courts of law, administrative authorities or legislative bodies, the best interests of the child shall be a primary consideration.
